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

Camden says, the Bibroci inhabited these Parts, who submitted themselves to fulius Vol. III.

Casar, upon his crossing the Thames not far from hence, and this he partly deduces from the Name Bibrate in France, now contracted into Bray, and seems to think no Place corresponds so exactly to the Situation of the Bibroci as this. I have not indeed heard of any Remains of Roman Antiquity sound here, but in all the adjacent Parts they have occurred, so that these Parts might in all probability be not unknown to the Romans.

Against the North Wall of the Chancel, towards the East, is a large Monument, containing the Busto of a Man in a Gown, leaning his Hands on a Scull: By him his Wife, holding a Book in her Hands; and this Inscription under them.

If what I was thou seekest to know,
These Lynes my Character shall shew,
Those Benefits that God me lent,
With Thankes I tooke, and freely spent;
I scorned what Plainess could not gett,
And next to Treason hated Debt;
I loved not those that stirr'd up Strife,
True to my Friend, and to my Wise;
The latter here by me I have,
We had one Bed, and have one Grave;
My Honesty was such, that I
When Death came, feared not to dye.

In the said North Wall is another Monument, in which are the Figures of a Man and his Wife, kneeling at a Desk, engraven on Brass Plates, with the sollowing Inscription.

When Oxford gave thee two Degrees in Art,

A Love possessed thee Master of my Heart.

Thy Colledge Fellowship thou left'st for myne,

And nought but Death could sep'rate thee

Thirty Five Teares we lived in wedlock Bands,

Under the South Wall, near the East End of the South Ile, lies a Marble Gravestone with the following Inscription on it.

Under this are the Figures of his two Daughters.

On another Grave-stone, in the said Ile, is this Inscription.

Here lieth buried the Body of Mrs. ELIZABETH PARRY, Wife to HUGH PARRY, of New Windsor, Gen Gentleman, Daughter to JOHN PAGE, Esq; of this Parish. She dyed the 29 of May, in the Teare 1659.

On the South Side of a great Pillar, erected between the South and middle Ile, is fixed a Brass Plate, bearing the Essigles of a Man and his Wife praying at a Desk, and under them is this Inscription.

Neere anto this Place lyeth buried the Bodies of Arthur Page, of Walter Okeley, in the Parish of Bray, and County of Berks, Gent. who had to Wife Sessely Brownesopp, Daughter of William Brownesopp, Esq; They had Mue one Son, Edward Page. The said Arthur deceased the 23 Day of Decemb. Ano. 1610. and the said Sessely dyed the 12th Day of March, Ano. 1598.

On a Brass Plate fixed to a Grave-stone, under the Communion Table, is this Infcription.

aged 81.

Loe, here a Friend enclosed, now at rest, Whose Soule, no doubt, is placed by the best. His Purse was open bath to Rich and Poore, To Freind and Foe, so likewise was his Doore. He aym'd at Peace in all his Course of Lyse, He hated Difference and avoyded Strife, From whence it may be said he is in Bliss, Which Christ affoards to none but those are His. He hath a Conquest, being gone before, Our Combatts are to come, our Sorrowes more.

Lastly, his Office found his Livery, sued now, bearing date 1641. Nov. 13. To whose Memory KATHERINE his Wife, as a Memoriall of her Affection to her deceased Husband, imposed this Stone.

On a Marble Grave-stone, Eastward of the former, is the following Inscription.

This mentioned Monument is fet in the North Wall of the Chancel.

Under the East Window of the North Ile is a large Brass Plate fastened in the Wall, whereon is engraved the Figure of William Norris in Armour (sometime Usher of the Black Rod to the most Noble Order of Garter) over which is his Mantle, having St. George's Arms in an Escotcheon incircled with the Garter thereon. Behind him are Figures of his six Sons; before him kneels his Wise, and behind her six Daughters. Beneath this Plate, in the Wall, is also a Black Marble bearing the following Inscription.

WILLIAM NORREYS, of Fifeild, in Bray, Esquire, who was Usher of the Parliament House, and of the Noble Order of the Garter, a Gentleman Pencioner, Controller of the Workes of C2 Wand-

Windsor-Castle, and Parkes there. and Keeper of Folli-John Parke, which Offices he had by the Guift of Queene Mary, and enjoyed them during Lyfe, most faithfully serving his noble Soveraigne Queene Elizabeth; a Justice of the Peace of Berkshire; ever of honest Behaviour and good Reputation, favouring the verteous, pleasuring many, hurting none, dyed at his Houle of Fyfeild, 16 Aprilis, 1591. at the Age of 68 Yeares, after he had been married 43 Teares, and had Mue 6 Sons and 6 Daughters, and is interred by his Ancestors, under the Stone graven with his Armes here before lying.

Lower in the North Ile lyes a Gravestone, with the following Inscription on a Brass Plate.

On another Brass Plate, fixed in a Stone somewhat Westward of the former, is this Inscription.

Here, under this Marble Stone, lyeth buried the Body of CLEMENT KEIKE, Gapt. who had to Wife Eliz. Dangleter to Alderman Becher, he was borne at Bristow, and was a Citizen of London, a Merchant Venterer, and Free of the Haberdashers, being of the Age of 70 Teares, deceased this 24th of Sept. An. Dni. 1593.

In a Brass Plate fixed to a Grave-stone, near the West End of the North Ile, is this Inscription.

Here lyeth buried the Body of THOMAS LAWRENCE, of Bray, in the County of Berks, who dyed the 28th of October, 160?. On a Brass Plate fixed to a Grave-stone, in the Body of the Church, are the Figures of a Man and his Wife, and under them this Inscription.

Upon another Gravé-stone is this Inscription.

Heere lye interred the Bodies of THOMAS CHERRY, of Maydenhead, in this Parish, who dyed 14th Sept.
1657. Anno Ætatis 61°.
And of ELLEN his Wife, who died 19th Sept. 1657. Anno Ætatis 59°.
They lived together in Wedlock 35 Teares, and had 8 Sons and one Daughter, and were both interred here in one Grave, Sept. 20. 1657.

Heere lye also the Bodies of WILLIAM
CHERRY and THOMAS CHERRY,

## MAIDENHEAD.

Or as some have falsely called it, Maidenbith, is the only Village, besides Bray, in the Hundred of that Name.

We are not ignorant that *Hithe* agrees to the Situation of the Place; but we have that Authority for the other Name,

which ought never to be slighted.

It is of no great Antiquity. The antient Name, according to our \* greatest Antiquary, was South Alington, which Stow has contracted into Sudlington. But it took the Name of Maidenbead, according to the same Author, from the Head of one of those Eleven Thousand Virgins, said to have suffer'd Martyrdom with St. Ursula, which was had here in very great Veneration. This is the true Original of the Name, and this Opinion the World then had of the great Numbers that accompanied St. Ursula in her Death.

But the true Foundation of this Story having been discover'd, we shall take this Opportunity of acquainting the Reader

with

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with it. It will deserve the more credit, because it comes from a Roman Catholick Writer, and he too one of the greatest of his \* Order. In a very antient MS. Martyrology, older than the general Ignorance of the Monks, he tells us he met with the following Words: Ursula & Undecimilla, VV. MM. i. e. Ursula and Undecimilla, Virgins and Martyrs. This Undecimilla, the Name of one Virgin only, came afterwards through Ignorance to be changed by the Monks into Undecim mille, i. e. Eleven Thousand, which by degrees came generally to prevail.

About two Miles above the Town Northward, there was formerly a Ferry at a Place called Babham-End; fo that 'twas not till after a Bridge was built at Maidenhead, and the Road brought that Way, that the Place began to flourish.

Leland says, at the West End of the Bridge, in his Time, was a great Wharfage of Timber and Fire Wood, which came out of Berkshire, out of the Woods of the Forest of Windsor, and out of the great Fryth.

This Town was first incorporated by the Name of the Fraternity or Guild of

the

the Brothers and Sisters of Madenbeith, in the 26th of Edward III. and John Husbands, Citizen and Blader of London, bequeathed 100 l. in Money to obtain a certain Revenue, sufficient for a Chanter to one Chapel, which was dedicated to St. Andrew the Apostle, and St. Mary Magdalen. In consideration of this 100 l. the Prior and Convent of Hurley obliged themselves to find one Chaplain for the said Chapel.

In the 30th of Henry VI. the Patent-Roll, dated Dec. 20. recites this Grant, and confirms it with the Addition of feve-veral new Privileges. Tho. Mattyngham was constituted the first Chaplain.

After the Reformation it was incorporated by the Name of Warden and Burgesses, and it continued so till the Reign of King James II. who granted them a new Charter, and incorporated them by the Name of Mayor and Aldermen, with Liberty to chuse a High-Steward and a Steward. So that their present Constitution is a High Steward, a Mayor, a Steward, and ten Aldermen: Out of these last mention'd they chuse two Bridge-ma-The Mayor, the Stewsters every Year. ard, and the Mayor for the Year preceding, are Justices of the Peace. Mayor is Clerk of the Market, and Coroner:

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ner: He is likewise Judge of the Court, which he is obliged to hold once in three Weeks, and oftner, by Adjournment. The Mayor and Aldermen chuse two Serjeants yearly, who bear the Mace. They have a Goal within the Corporation, not only for Debtors, but also to secure such Pelons as shall happen to be taken there. The Mayor holds a Session twice a Year, and, in Conjunction with the Aldermen, has Power of making By-Laws for the Good of the Corporation.

They have a very good Market here every Wednesday, and three Fairs in the Year; on Wednesday in Whitsun Week, on St. Mary Magdalen's Day, i. e. 22d of July, and on that of St. Thomas the Apo-

Ale.

The Revenue of the Corporation is but fmall, confishing chiefly of the Toll of the Market, the Toll of the Bridge, and

three or four small Tenements.

The Town is situated in two Parishes, part of it in Bray, and part in Cookham, though they have a Chapel peculiar to the Corporation, sounded by Mr. John Husbands. The Minister is chosen by the Inhabitants in a Common Hall, called for that purpose. He is not obliged to attend the Bishop's Visitation. His Income is by Subscription, saving 14 No-Vol. III.

bles from the Crown, in Consideration of the 100 l. above-mentioned, which was paid into the Exchequer at the Dissolution of Monasteries, a good House, Garden and Orchard, a Close called Little East-more-Hill, given him by one Mr. Towns-end, of Staple-Inn, and a small Slip of Meadow, lying in Foreleys, given by the

Founder Mr. John Husbands.

James Smith, Esq; Citizen and Salter of London, in the Year 1659. erected an Alms-house in that Part of the Town which is in Cookham Parish, and endowed it with 40 l. a Year. It consists of eight Houses for eight poor Men and their Wives, so that every House has yearly 5 l. and every Person a new Gown once in two Years. To this Benefaction of her Husband's, Mrs. Smith, his Widow, gave 8 l. a Year more to the said Hospital, i. e. 1 l. to every House to buy them Wood. The Salter's Company are the Trustees of this Charity.

Mr. Smith left also 5 l. 4 s. a Year to be distributed in Bread, 2 s. every Sunday to the Poor of Maidenhead, on Cookham Side, and to the Poor of the same Parish at

large.

He gave also the Minister of Maidenhead, 1 l. a Year for preaching a Sermon on Charity every New Year's Day, and as much ( 27 )

much to the Minister of Cookham for preaching another on Easter Monday, and administring the Sacrament to the poor Alms-People.

He order'd besides to be paid yearly,

To the Church-Wardens of Cookham,
To the Clerk of Cookham,
To the Chapel-Wardens of Maidenbead,
And to the Clerk of the fame
Place,

On a small Stone over the Alms-House, in Capitals, is this Inscription.

These Alms-Houses were erected, and built at the sole and proper Cost and Charges of James Smyth, \* Esquior, Citizen and Salter of London, in the Tear of our Lord, 1659.

Mr. Ralph Pool gave 10 l. a Year, issuing out of his House called Munkendons, for the Poor of Maidenbead, to be distributed in Bread, 4 s. every Sunday.

Mrs. Poole settled a Farm of about 14 %. a Year to buy Cloth to clothe the Poor of Maidenhead yearly, by Trustees chosen

within the Corporation.

One Ring, a Taylor, gave a Tenement worth about 8 1. a Year, to be distributed yearly among fuch poor House-keepers as receive no Alms within the Corporation.

Mr. Rixmond gave a Tenement of 9 l. a Year to put out poor Boys Apprentices.

Mrs. Merrywid gave 5 La Year, to issue out of her Houses in Maidenbead, to teach

five poor Boys to read and write.

Four Pounds a Year was given for the same purpose by Mr. Abraham Spoor, and another Sum to put out Apprentices: But his Gift is not for above 20 Years to come.

The Bridge is maintained by the Corporation, for which they have the Tolls allow'd them both over and under the Bridge; to which may be added three Trees given by the Crown yearly out of the Forest of Windsor, towards repairing the fame.

The Barge-Pier divides the two Counties of Buckingham and Berks.

About the middle of the Town stands the small Chapel before-mentioned, wherein is only the following Inscription, on a Black (29)

Black Marble Grave-stone, in the middle Ile, in Capitals.

Here lyeth interred the Body of John Whitfeild, Esq, who dyed the 9th Day of Aprill, in the Teare of our Lord, 1663. in the 46th Tear of his Age.

Here lyeth also interred the Body of Mrs. Hannah Whitseild, Widd. and Reliet of the said John Whitseild, who dyed the 5th Day of July, An. Dom. 1665. Ano. Etat. sua 49.

In an MS. in the Possession of Thomas Rawlinson, of the Middle Temple, Esq; and F. R. S. is the following Account of an Estate (in this Place) formerly in the Possession of the Hospital of St. Niebelas at Tork, and at the Dissolution passed into other Hands, which the following Passage gives you a full Account of.

## OLD WINDSOR,

Is a small Village lying near the Bank of the Thames, and a Vicaridge in the Hundred of Ripplesmore, and Deanery of Reading, in the Gift of the Lord Chancellor; present Incumbent is the Reverend Dr. La Croze.

In this Place is a Seat belonging to the Lord Viscount Weymouth.

In the middle of a fair Marble Slabb, on a raised Tomb, on the North Side of the Chancel, are the Figures of a Man in a Gown, and his Wife in her usual Habit, and near them the following Verses.

A faithful Husband, and his loving Wife, With their obedient Son here buried lye: All which, by their religious Course of Life, Left good Examples to Posterity. And though their Bodies now sleepe in the Dust, Their Soules, in Heaven, live among the Just.

## NEW WINDSOR,

Has the Addition of the Term New, to distinguish it from the last mentioned Place (out of whose Ruins it rose) and lyes at the East End of this County, and is divided by the River Thames (which washes the lowest Parts of this Place) from Eton in Buckinghamshire. It is a Vicarage situate in Ripplesmore Hundred, in the Patronage of the King. Of this Place we have no Account before the Saxon Times, when it was called Windlesbore, from its winding Banks on the River. It was by Edward the Confessor bestowed on Westminster-Abbey, in whose Possession it remained but a short Time, being transferred to Will. the Conqueror, in Exchange for other Lands elsewhere, by the Abbot and (57)

and Monks of that Convent. This Place was made a Free Borough, and had a Charter of great Privileges granted to it by King Edw. I. 1276. from which Time it has been gradually encreasing in building, &c. Much is said of this Place in Brady's History of Boroughs, pag. 38, and 84. and in Bohun's Debates in Parliament, pag. 332, and 333. where is the following Charter, copied from the 141st. Page of the XXVth Volume of the laborious Mr. Dedesworth's Collections, among the \* MSS. of the Bodleian Library in Oxford.

This Corporation consists of a Mayor, two Bailiss, and twenty eight other Persons, who are to be chosen out of the Inhabitants of the Borough, thirteen of which are called Fellows, and ten of them Aldermen, or chief Benchers, out of which the Mayor and two Bailiss are to be elected. This Place sends also two Burgesses to represent it in Parliament, of whom you may see the List in pag. 35, 36, 37, and 38. of the Notitia Parliamentaria, Vol. I. Lond. 1715. 8vo. compiled by that worthy Patron of, and diligent Enquirer into

the Antiquities of England, particularly those of the County of Bucks, Browne Willis, of Whaddon Hall, Esq; This Town consists of several Streets, many of which lye near the Castle: The High Street, and largest, lyes Southward, where in 1380. 4 Ric. II. was erected a handsom Cross by John Sadler, which was much beautified and repaired, and a Crucifix placed on its Top in 1635. by Godfrey Goodman, Bishop of Gloucester, which, as I have seen in Letters to, and from the faid Prelate, gave great Offence to some of the purer Saints of those Times, by whose Endeavours, I presume, it was demolished in the most impious Rebellion, begun 1641. there being now not the smallest Vestigia of its Existence. In this Street stands a fair Market-House, or Guild-Hall, on Pillars, erected in the Time of King Charles II. at the North End of which is a Statue, vested in her Royal Robes, of the late Queen Anne, with a Scepter in her right Hand, and a Globe in her lett, and under her Feet this Distich, made by William Piesley, Esq; Counsellor at Law, of the Middle Temple; in London, late Under Steward of this Town, and Castle adjoining, in Gold Capitals, at the Charge of this Corporation.

Feb. 15, 1503, JOHN TOMPSON, and WILLIAM HUNTRED, Chaplains, and JOHN COMP, Gent. by a Deed gave to the Corporation of New Windfor, 4 Tenements in Sheer-Street, that they might elect poor Persons, Men or Women, to inhabit, in them. These People are said only to have been Feosses in Trust from William Paynell, and Thomas Hant, who

are judged the true Benefactors.

THOMAS BROTHERTON, alias HUNT, by a Deed bearing: Date 25 Aug. 1510, for the Support of 4: Alms-Houses in Sheer-street, gave 14 Acres of Pasture and Wood Ground, called Butter-Stoakes; 3 Acres and a half of Arable Land in Church Field; 2 Acres of Wood Ground call'd Scott's Grove; one Acre of Arable in a Field called Pidwell; and one Parcel of Meadow lying at Stakes; all the Lands in the Parish of Warfield in Berkshire, valued at 10 l, per Annum; two Acres of Land in Warfield Common Field, called Ferris Hill, at the yearly Reat of Two Shillings per Annum.

THOMAS JENKINSON, of New Windsor, Gent. by his last Will made about the Year 1596. gave 5 Acres and an half of Land in the Parish of Rushcombe in Berkshire, called East Mead and the Eight, that the Profits should be distributed to such of the poor Inhabitants of this Place, as shall be approved of by the Vicar, and eldest Alderman of this Corporation.

THOMAS NEEDHAM, of this Place, Gent. by his last Will, dated Aug. 1. 1603. gave to the Vicar and Church-Wardens, and to their Successors for ever, 3 Houses in New Windsor; two near the Church-Gate, and one in Pescod-street, the Rents of which are to be disposed of on each Sunday to Twelve poor People of the Parish, not of the Alms-House.

THOMAS ALDEM, of this Place, Gent. by a Deed dated 23 May, 1604. gave a Close of Pasture Ground, near Pattock's Gate, in this Parish, to build Pest Houses.

WILLIAM DAY, Son of Matthew Day, Alderman of this Town, gave a House and Garden in Pescod-street, by a Deed dated 16 Aug. 1664, the Rent of which was to be distributed to such of the poor Inhabitants, as the Vicar and the three eldest Aldermen shall approve of.

The aforesaid William Day did by another Deed dated 28 July, 1668. give 4

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Acres of Meadow Ground lying in Meadbay, in the Parish of Langley, in Buckingbamshire, for the same Uses, to be distributed by the Mayor, three eldest Aldermen, and Chamberlain of the Town for the Time being.

RICHARD GALLIS, of this Place, Gent. gave by Indenture, dated 30 July, 1666. a Legacy to this Corporation, with which was bought Munday Close, lying between Woodbridge-lane, and Moat-Park, in this Parish, the Revenues of which he assigned to the Support of the 4 Alms-Houses.

This Parish bought of Francis Ridley, of Windfor-Castle, Esq; for 36 Pounds, by Indenture dated 20 May, 1673. one Acre, and one Rood and an half of Meadowlying in Meadbay, in the Parish of Langley March, in Bucks, the Profits to be applied to the Use of the Poor of New Windsor.

Arch-Bishop Laud, by his last Will, gave 50 per Annum to Apprentice poor Boys, and for marrying of poor Maidens in this Parish, which was settled by a Deed dated 208tob. 1672. by Sir John Robinson, Bar. and the other Executors.

Dr. CHALLONER, Rector of Agmondesham, in Buckingbamsbire, by his Will about 1621. gave, after the Decease of Christian his Wife, an Annuity of 6 Pounds out of his Estate in East Oakley, Fifeil Fifeild and Bray, to be distributed half yearly to Twelve of the godliest Poor of this Parish, to be chosen and changed yearly by the Dean of Windsor, Mayor and Minister of the same Town. This com-

menced 25 Mar. 1637.

JANE BALDWIN, of Hillington, in Bucking hamshire, Widdow, for 60 Years, from 1671. gave 4 Acres and a half of Arable Land in Meadsield, in the Parish of Langley, in Bucking hamshire, the Rent of which, Two Pounds Twelve Shillings, is appropriated to the Use of the Poor of this Parish.

RICHARD REEVE, of Dagnall, in Backing hamshire, Gent. by a Deed dated 11 October, 1676. gave to this Corporation a Close of Pasture Ground in the Parish of Wing feild, in this County, five Acres of Land, the Rents of which are to be distributed by the Mayor, 4 senior Aldermen, senior Church-Warden, and senior Overfeer, who are to nominate 50 poor People who receive no other Charity, to be paid yearly, on Jan. 12. and July 12. one Shilling in Bread, all to continue during their Lives, and their Vacancies to be supplied by the aforesaid Trustees.

The same Gentleman, by a Deed dated Aug. 20. 1688. gave sour Brick Tenements, or Alms-Houses, near the Pitts-

fields,

fields, with the Gardens, for the Use of Four poor Women during their Lives. (except removed for any heinous Crimes) to be elected by the Mayor, two fenior Vicar, Aldermen. Chamberlain, two fenior Church-Wardens, within two Months after any Vacancy; and upon their Default, the Election to lapse to the Dean and Canons of Windfor. The Perfons to be elected are to be upwards of 50 Years of Age, Members of the Establish'd Church of England, and not to Marry after their Election, upon Pain of Expulsion.

The same Gentleman, by his last Will, dated 9 Decemb. 1688. gave 200 Pounds to purchase Lands for the Support of the Alms-Houses, and 100 Pounds towards finishing of the New Market-House here.

KATHERINE CAREY, late Wife of John Carey, of Stanwell, in Middlefex, Efq; by a Deed dated Aug. 1. 1673. gave 100 Pounds to be distributed to 6 poor Widows; at the Discretion of John Carey, and Giles Gent, Esqs; John Carey, by a Deed dated Dec. 20. 1679. also charged an Annuity of 6 Pounds per Annun, for ever, on the Catherine Wheel in Colebrook, to be applied to the same Uses. The Election of the Widows to be in the Mayor and Burgesses, in a Common Hall held for that end.

WILLIAM GALLAND, late of New Windfor, Gent. by his last Will dated 13 April, 1693. gave 3 Pounds per Annum, out of a House called the Three Tuns there, to be pay'd at two half yearly Payments, and laid out in Bread for the Poor, at the discretion of the Mayor, 3 senior Aldermen, the Church-Wardens and Overseers of the Poor.

It appears by a Decree of the Commissioners for charitable Uses, held in the Vestry of the Parish Church of Clewar, April 6. An. Reg. Jac. I. 7º That the Commissioners decred one John Phippes, Owner of a Tenement in More-street, and of a Tenement and 4 Acres of Land at Clewar. his Heirs, Executors, &c. should stand chargeable with the following Payments, viz. 10 s. to be pay'd quarterly to the Poor of New Windsor; Six Shillings to the two poorest Couples that shall be married within the Year, and 3 s. and 4 d. to the Church, payable at Easter, which several Sums were decreed to be in full of the Benefactions design'd by the last Will of Henry Franklin, made Anno 17 Regina Eliz.

It appears by the Copy of a Deed kept in this Vestry, dated 16 July, 8 Jac. I. that there is issuing out of a House next joyning to the Pest-House, the annual Rent of

of 3 s. 4 d. to the Poor, which seems to have been the Gift of William Lorde, of this Place Smith.

Mrs. MARGARET OSBOURNE, by her last Will, gave 25 Pounds towards the Founding of a Stock of Corn and Coles for the Poor of this Parish.

Andrew Windsor, late of Bentley, in Hampsbire, Esq; by his last Will, 2 Aug. 1653. gave 200 Pounds towards founding a Stock to employ the Poor in the Clothing Manusacture, with which a Rent Charge of 14 Pounds per Annum, payable out of Windfor-Mill, which being sold to Queen Anne, in lieu of it a like Rent Charge was settled by a Deed dated 24 June, 1705. payable out of the Butcher's Shambles in the Market Place of this Town.

Doctor Jobn Heaver, late Vicar of this Town, Prebendary of the Church of Windfor, and Fellow of Eton College, gave 100 Pounds, the Interest of it to be applied to the Apprenticing poor Boys in the Parishes

of Eton, and Windsor.

WILLIAM CHILD, Mus. Dr. late of Windsor Castle, gave 50 Pounds to this Corporation, for such charitable Uses as the Mayor, &c. shall think fit; with which they have settled an annual Charge of 5 Pounds towards binding one poor Boy Apprentice.

P 2 HENRY

HENRY LUCAS, late of London, Esq; founded an Hospital at Wokingham in Berkshire, for 16 poor Brethren, 9 of which are to be Natives of Berkshire, and elected by the following Parishes, each in their turn, Wokingham Parish, Arbersield, Wokingham Town, Finchamstead, New Windsor, Easthamstead, Clewar, Old Windsor, Barkham, Binfeild, Hurst, Bray, Sandhurst, Winckfeild, Swallowsfeild, and Sunningbill.

Mrs. Mary Barker, late of Landon, Widow, by her last Will, dated 21 Nov. 1704. gave 300 Pounds, to purchase Lands within 10 Miles of this Place, for the Support of a School-Master and School-Misters in New Windsor, and in the Tything of Inglesield, in the Parish of Egham in Surrey, and in Tately in Hampshire, towards teaching of the poor Children of the said Parish to Read and Work.

Mrs. Eliz. Metcalfe, by her Will dated 14 Qctob. 1709. late of Isleworth in Middlesex, Widow, gave 80 Pounds, the Interest of which is to be given to 4 poor House-Keepers not receiving Alms, 2 to be cleded by the Vicar, and 2 by the Over-seers, and to be pay'd half yearly.

JOHN CLARK, late Mayor of this Town, by his Will dated 27 Decemb. 1710. gave 60 Pounds towards building a Charity

rity School in the Church-yard, or elfewhere, as the Trustees shall think sit. And by a Codicil dated 4 Feb. 1712. 50 Shillings more was charged on his Dwelling House in New Windsor, to be pay'd Hight Days after Sbrove Tuesday, to Twenty poor House-Keepers not receiving Alms, at the discretion of the Minister and Church-Wardens for the Time being.

This Town has a weekly Market, on every Saturday, and 3 Fairs, on June 24. Octob. 16. and on Easter Tuesday. The Manor of this Borough was Lett in Lease by King James I. 1602. to this Corporation, to pay annually to the Crown a Quit-Rent of Four Pounds, Four Shillings and Five Pence.

## WINDSOR CASTLE.

In my Account of New Windsor, Page 56, I mentioned that the Manor of this Place came into the Possession of the Crown by an Exchange at the Conquest, when also a Castle was built here, which Domestary Book tells us contained half a Hide of Land, in these Words, —— Terra Radulphi, filii Seifridi, Radulfus filius Seifridi, tenet de Rege Clivore, pro quinque Hidia, mode

modo pro quatuor Hidis et dimid. Castellum de Wyndesores est in dimidia Hida. Castle King Henry I. re-edified and enlarged, and kept his Whit sontide here in 1109. where all his Nobles attended him. Shortly after, in a Treaty of Peace concluded between the Usurper Stephen and King Henry II. this was termed Mota de Windesore. When King Richard I. went into the Holy Land, and had delegated an equal Authority to the Bishops of Ely and Durham; the first of whom taking Possession of the Tower of London, the last retired hither as the second Fortress of this Nation. Queen Eleanor, Confort to King Edward I. took much delight here, and here she bore some of her Children: In the Reign of her Son Edward II. his Queen was delivered here of Edward of Windfore, well known afterwards to France and Scotland, by the Name of Edward III. To him this Place owes most of its present Magnificence; here he employed Workmen for many Years, under the direction of the famous William of Wickham, afterwards Bishop of Winchester: He seems to have began this in 1348. And though Writs were issued out to the Sheriffs of feveral Counties to impress Labourers, ಲೆc. into the Service, yet the Buildings were scarce ready for Glasing in 1355; nor was it finish'd till 1368. In future Kings

Kings Reigns Additions were made, as the Fabrick adjoyning to the King's Lodgings, in the upper Ward by King Henry VII.

In the Windows of King Henry VIIth's Closet are these Coats of Arms.

II. A White Rose within a Red, the first the Badge of the true Heirs to the Crown, viz. the House of Tork, the other that of Lancaster.

A Lion, a Dragon, an Antilope, a Bull, a Hart, a Faulcon crowned, standing on the Root of a Role Tree, with Roses bud-

ding out of it.

The new great Gate, at the entrance of the lower Ward, was built by King Henry VIII. other Additions were made by King Edward VI. and his Sister Queen Mary erected a curious Fountain in the middle of the inner Court, into which Water was conveyed from Blackmore Park, near Winkfield, which served the whole Castle. Queen Elizabeth made the Terrace Walk on the North Side, all faced with Free-stone, from whence is a delightful Prospect down upon Eton College, the Thames, and the neighbouring Country.

Over the Door of the Chapel, in the King's Lodge, is this Inscription.

## This Chapel was built, 1571. E. R. \*

King Charles I. An. 1626. built the Gate at the East End of the Terrace, with the Draw Bridge leading into the Park: But during the Time of the long Rebellion, the Buildings, &c. run much to Ruin, which were at a vast Expence at the Restoration repaired, beautified, and a handsome Magazine of Arms placed here by King Charles II. The Lodgings were much improved in Painting, Magnificence, Beauty and Convenience by King James II. and William III. so that now they not only rival, but are accounted by impartial Judges, Foreigners as well as Natives, superior to the so much exalted Palace of Versailles. Situation of this Place is so very fine, and worthy Observation, that Sir John Denham, in his Cooper's Hill, has celebrated it in the following manner.

This Castle consists of two square Courts, with a Tower betwixt them, which are also called three Wards. The higher Ward is call'd the inner Square or Court, the

the middle Ward the Tower, and the lower Ward the outer Square. In the inner Square, toward the East, is the Royal Palace, and in the Middle of the Square is a very fine Statue of King Charles II. on Horseback, erected in the Year 1680. On the Park-side of the Square, to the North, are the Royal Apartments, with those of the Officers of the Houshold. The rest of the Square composes the Apartments of the Officers of the Crown. The Entrance to the Royal Apartment is through a Vestibule, supported by Pillars, with some antick Bustoes in the Niches; from whence you ascend the great Stairs to these Apartments on one Side; and on the Right Side of the Vestibulo, through a little Court, up another Pair of Stairs to St. George's Hall on the other Side. The Domes of these Stair-Cases are painted. From each of these Stairs you pass into a Guard-Hall, which is finely embellished with several Sorts of Arms, artfully disposed into Figures, as at the Tower of London. In the Cicling is Britannia on a Globe, the Indies offering her Riches, and Europe a Crown; all furrounded with a Circle in Form of a Above the Chimney of one of these Halls is the Picture of Prince George. of Denmark on Horseback, excellently done by Mr. Dabl; and that of the late King

King of Sweden over that of the other. In the Prosence Chamber, over the Chimney, is Judith and Molofernes, an admirable Piece; and over the Door Sn Marr Magdalen, masterly done. There is another Magdalen, an Original, in the Privy Chamber; and another Judith over the Door. In the Gallery, over the Door, is the Roman Daughter giving Suck to her Pather in Prilon. In the Bed Chamber is another Judich over the Closer-Door, and the Innocents oven that of the Chamber. the Cicling of the Cliffer the Story of Ledzand the Swan is wonderfully performed, In the Dining Room all Sorts of Fift and Poultry, and Fruit are very naturally represented; and in the Gallery there is a Picture much taken norice of for the Live. liness of the Light of a Candle, by which an old Woman is feen reading. Room of Audience, over the Chimney, is her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange, Mother to King William; and the Durchels of Riobmond, with this Inscription; —— Numero Dous impare gau-In the Cieling is King Charles IL supported by Peace and Pictorys. shore, every Apartment that composes this Palace is spacious and noble: The Canopies of State, under which the late Queen gave Audience, are as rich as Einbroidery

can make them; and the Pictures in the Closer, and little Gallery, with that of Engliff Beauties, are worth a Stranger's

coming to England on purpose to see.

From that Guard-Room, where we faid before was a Picture of the late King of Sweden, we pass into St. George's Hall, the finest Room in the World. Hall is very large and long, and defigned from the first Institution for the Entertainment of the Knights of the Garter at their Installation; and the Sovereign us'd to give a Feast to his Twenty Five Knights Companions every St. George's Day. this latter Cuftom has not been observed fince the Reign of King Charles IL. who made the last Feast of that kind at the Influitation of the present Duke of Bucking. ham; then Earl of Mulgrave.

On one Side of the Hall is painted King. Edward'III. fitting on a Throne, receiving. his triumphant Son Edward the Black Trince, with the Kings of France and Scotland Prisoners, full as big as the Life. To this Story Sir John Denham alludes in the following Lines, where he takes par-

ticular Notice.

On the Cieling are painted the Triumphs of King Charles II. over Faction, Rebellion, and Sedition, where the Painter has put the Picture of the Earl of Shaftesbury, Lord Chancellor in that Reign, representing Sedition with Libels in his Hand, a Man, who served all Times and Parties, according to his Interest, and was named as one of the King's Judges, though he had the Wit not openly to appear. At the upper End of the Hall is the

Picture of King William III. seated on a Throne, ten Steps high, five of which only are painted; and above this St. George

killing the Dragon.

From the Hall you pass into the Chapel-Royal, under an artificial Curtain supported by 4 Statues larger than the Life, which is pav'd with Marble, like the Hall, and admirably painted with some Histories of the New Testament. The Altar-Piece is the last Supper, and on the Cieling is a noble Ascension. All which excellent Pieces of Painting were performed by the masterly Hand of Signior Verrio a Neapolitan.

In passing from the inner Court to the outer, you go by the Tower above-mentioned, which is the Habitation of the Constable or Governor. It is built after the Manner of an Amphi-Theatre, very high, and very magnificent; and the Apartments are suitable to the Character of the Office, very noble. On the Top of the Tower the Standard is erected, as often as the Court, or Constable is at Windsor. King Charles II. had a Design of facing the Hill it stands on with Brick; but that Project was never sinished.

The lower Court is much larger, and equally broad with the upper. Here formerly stood a Chapel built by King Henry I.

and dedicated to King Edward the Conferfor: This was demolished by King Exward III. who raised another Pile, which he dedicated to St. George: But King Edward IV. (whose Inclination to, and Kindnels to this Place was very extraordinary) finding, upon a Survey, that this Chapel was very much decayed; and not stinking the Building large or stately enough, he resolved upon raising the present noble. difice; for this purpose he constituted Richard Beauchamp, Bilbop of Saram, Malter and Surveyor of the Works, to whom healfs gave a plenary Power of removing feveral irregular Buildings, or Offices, which might be Obstacles, particularly some anxiont Buildings on the East Side of the Chapel. which reached unto the Walls of the North Side of the Castle, where the Towers commonly called Clure ys Tower, and Le Amenor ys Tower, and Barner ys Tower were fituated; as also on the South Side of the Chapel unto the Belfrey.

This elegant and beautiful Gothick Structure, by the Diligence of the good Biffup, was foon raifed and enlarged, in length, at least, One Hundred Pathon, in 1474, though it attained to its present Beauty and Perfection not till the Reign of King Heary VIII. In the Reign of King Heary VIII. Sir Reginald Bray, (one of the Knights

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of the noble Order of the Garter) became a liberal Benefactor to the finishing of the Body of this Chapel; and building the middle Chapel on the South Side of it, still called by his Name (where his Body lyes interred) as it is manifest not only from his last Will, but also from his Coat of Armour, Crest, and the Initial Letters of his Christian and Surname, cut in Stone in several Parts of the Roof.

By an Indenture dated June 5. 1505; John Hylmer and William Vertue, Free Masons, undertook the Vaulting of the Roof of the Choir (that curious and excellent Piece of Architecture) for 700 Pounds, and to finish it by Christmas 1508. The Rood Loft and Lanthorn were erected by the Contributions of the Knights Com-

panions of the Garter in 1516.

Within this Chapel of Sr. George have been several Chantries founded, and endowed with Lands and other Revenues, appointed for the Maintenance of Chaplains and Priests to sing Masses there for the Souls of their Founders, and their Kindred, of which Mr. Ashmole's printed History, as well as MS. (from whom we must borrow much concerning this Chapel, College, and its several Endowments) gives us the following Account, viz.

During the great Rebellion this Churches Fate was very deplorable, and her infide was very much abused by the Saints of those Times, who had a Garrison here; the Organs and Windows being also defaced on 6 September, 1642.

In this Church are the following Monuments, viz.

In the East Ile, behind the High Altar, on a Marble Grave-stone, whereon is fixed a Brass Plate, having the Figure of an Ecclesiastick in his Habit, over which is his Robe, with an Escotcheon of St. George on his left Shoulder, is this Inscription.

At the South East End of this Ile is a Chapel, wherein stands a fair Alabaster Monument; on the Top is a Man prostrate, his Feet on a Grey Hound coller'd and chain'd, and by him a Woman, whose Feet stand on a Monkey coller'd: At the Head are the Statues of 2 Daughters, and on one Side 3 Daughters more; on the other Side 3 Sons, with a Head Piece between them. On the Sides is this Inscription.

Opposite to the said Pictures, on the South Side of the Ile, lyes a Grave-stone thus circumscribed.

On another Grave-stone, exactly like the last mentioned, is the following Inferention.

Dorothy King, lest to her Parent John King, Doctor of Divinitie, Prehendarie of this Chappell, and Marie his Wife, but speedily required again, Octob. 18. 1630.

On a Brass Plate, in the middle of this Scone, are these Verses.

Between the Choir and the Altar, under an Arch on the South Side, was a fair Monument erected over the Body of Henry VI. murder'd by Richard Duke of Gloucester, and removed from Chertsey Abbey in Surrey hither, of which nought now remains, except the several Devises of this King, and on the Key Stone his Vol. III. T Royal

Royal Arms, enfigned with a Crown, and supported by two Antilopes, collered and chained together. In the South Window of which Arch was painted the History of his unhappy Life, which, with many other Windows, were destroyed in the Rebellion. He was the Founder of St. Mary's College at Eton, and St. Nicholas's at Cambridge. Of him and his Rival, Mr. Pope, in his Windsor Forest, descants in the following manner, pag. 13.

Let softer Strains Ill-fated Henry mourn,
And Palms Eternal flourish round bu Urn;
Here o'er the Martyr King the Marble weeps,
And fast beside him once fear'd Edward sleeps,
Whom not th' extended Albion could contain,
From old Belerium to the German Main,

In the North Ile, near the Chapter-House Door, on a Marble Grave-stone, was the Figure of an Ecclesiastick, but now stol'n away; on either Side of the Body are remaining 3 Scrowls thus inscribed.

At the Feet is this defective Inscription.

Near this Place is a Monument of Steel polished and gilt, representing a pair of Gates betwixt two Towers, all of transparent Workmanship, after the Gotbick Manner, placed in the North Arch, faced through with Touch Stone, erected in Memory of King Edward the Fourth, who died 9 April, 1483. Over this Arch hung the King's Coat of Male, gilt, covered over with Crimson Velvet, and on it were the Arms of France and England quarterly, richly embroidered with Pearl and Gold, interwoven with feveral Rubies. This Trophy of Honour had ever fince his Funeral hung fafely over his Grave, but was plundered thence by Captain Fogg, 23 October, 1642. (on which Day he also robb'd the Treasury of the Chapel of all the rich Plate, dedicated to the Use of the Altar) yet having met with

an exact Measure and Size of each Part thereof, as also of his Banner, both theretosore taken by Sir William le Neve, sometime Clarencieux King of Arms, an exact Observator of any Thing curious, referring to Arms of Ceremony, we think six to transmit it thus to Posterity.

The Coat of Arms was two Foot seven Inches deep, and below two Foot in

breadth.

Above (the Maunches being extended) in Breadth three Foot and fix Inches; whereof the length of each Maunch was one Foot.

The Breadth of the upper Part of the Coat, besides the Maunches, one Foot and a half.

The Breadth of each Maunch one Foot

and eight Inches.

The Arms were embroidered upon Velver, lin'd with Sattin, and better wrought than they used to Work in those Days.

The Banner, which also hung over his Grave, was of Taffaty, and thereon painted quarterly France and England: It had in Breadth three Foot four Inches, besides a Fringe of about an Inch broad, and in Depth five Foot and four Inches, besides the Fringe.

On the Monument there never was any Inscription, take one therefore composed

On a Brass Plate, on another Marble Grave-stone, towards the North, is this Inscription.

whose Cause he strenuously espoused and for the keeping his Castle of Raglan with a strong Garrison at his own sole Expence, till it became the last in England or Wales, but one, that held out against the Rebels, and then not yeilding it, but after a long Siege, and to the Lord Fairfax, Generalissimo of the Parliaments Forces, in revenge of which Obstinacy, as they termed it, it was demolished, and all his Woods and Parks (which were vast) cut down and deftroyed, and his Estate sold, by the AET of the then rebellious Parliament, to the great Damage of himself and Posterity (wherein also lyes the Body of

Henry the Restorer's Son.)
This Chappell being in the Time of the aforesaid Rebellion, upon the foremention'd Account, much defac'd, and the Brass Work, to a considerable Value, plunder'd and imbezell'd, was restor'd to its primitive Form and Shape, and what was wanting thereunto supply'd, at the Expence and Charge of his present Grace, Henry Duke of Beaufort, Marquess and Earl of Worcester, Lord Herbert of Chepstow, Raglan, and Gower, &c. Knight of the most Noble Order of the Garter, and in the last 2 Reigns President of

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the Councill; in the Principal of Wales, Lord Lieut. of the Counties and Cities of Gloucester, Hereford, Bristoll, Monmouth, and of all Wales, Constable of the Castle of St. Briavels, Lord Warden of the Forest of Dean, High Steward of the Cities of Gloucester and Hereford, and of the Townes of Malmesbury, Tewksbury and Andover, Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber, and one of the Lords of her Majesties most honourable Privy Councill. In the Teare of our Lord 1699.

In this Chapel stands a fair raised Tomb, erected by himself, for Charles Somerset, Earl of Worcester, who died April 15. 1526. and his first Wife, Elizabeth Herbert, Daughter and Heir of William Earl of Huntington, and Lord Herbert of Gower and Chepstow. lye their Statues in Alabaster; He apparell'd in the Habit of St. George, She bearing on her Kirtle the Arms of Herbert embossed and painted, and on her Mantle her Husband's Arms. The Monument is furrounded with Brass Work. hang his Helm and Crest. On the Wall are painted several Devices and Badges. viz. a Portcullis, with a Bend Sinister over it, a Fleur de lu, a Plume of Fea-Vol. III. thers, thers, the Red Rose, a Grey Hound, Antilope, &c.

At the East End of this Place is a noble White Marble Monument, representing a Person cumbent, with a Canopy over him, and Justice on the Top of it, adorned with Penons, a Standard, Banners, &c. At the bottom is this Inscription.

Near

Near the first Haut Pace, in the Choir of this Chapel, were interred the Bodies of King Henry the VIIIth. and according to Clarendon, Jane Seymour his Wife; but it is said to have been his last Queen, Katherine Parr, according to Mr. Ashmole: A noble Author ends this King's Life with wishing that he could leave bim in his Grave, which feems to have put an authoritative Stamp on that fabulous Story raised on his Daughter Queen Mary, that she was so bigotted, as to permit the burning of her Father's dead Body, as a Heretick; but I think her own Character (fair enough, not withstanding all the Obloquy thrown on it) would sufficiently clear her from such an Inhumanity. But there is faid to be stronger, as well as later Evidence of its falfity: At the Burial of King Charles the Ist. of Blessed Memory, who was laid in the same Vault, with his Head lying over against the Eleventh Stall, on the Soveraign's Side; the Barl of Clarendon tells us, in his History of the Rebellion, printed in  $8v^{\circ}$  at Oxford, 1707. Vol. 5. pag. 260. that King Charles I. was interred only near; (whereas our Author, Mr. Albmole, fays it was in the very Vault of King Henry VIII.) but I wonder not at all at their Disagreement, when I consider they

both might have received it from the Reports of Persons present, who in the Confusion they were in at the Funeral, might have easily been mistaken; but where-ever King Charles Ist's Body was laid, by the Care of the rebellious Governor of this Castle, Wbitchcot, after the Restoration, neither Grave nor Corpse could be found, tho' no small search was made after it, when an honourable Interment was deligned, and some Persons then alive present at the Solemnity, giving this Account to the King (Charles II.) the thought of that Remove was laid aside; and the Reason communicated to very few, for the better discountenancing farther Enquiry. Our noble Historian, in pag. 260, and 261. is more particular than I have here, to avoid Repetition, mentioned. On the other Hand, Dr. Nalton in his Preface to the King's Trial, tells the World, that when the Long Parliament had voted an honourable Interment for their late Prince, who had fuffer'd fo unjuftly, all was stopt, by reason that the Persons order'd to regulate the Ceremony, when they came to examine the Royal Coffin, found the Body missing. This, fays an Anonymous \* Author, (upon

what Grounds he knows best) " puts " me in mind of what a worthy Gentle-" man, who travelled with Lord A-" into Italy, told me some Years ago, viz. " that during his short stay at Bern, in " Switzerland, a Syndic of the Town, " who used frequently to visit Major Ge-" neral Ludlow, heard him in a vaunting " manner affirm, That tho' Ireton and " Cromwell were buried under Tyburn, yet "'rwas a Comfort to him, that the Roy-" al Martyr kept them Company; for, " fays he, foreseeing that his Son would " undoubtedly come in, we took care " that his Father's Body should not be " idolatroully worshipped by the Cava-" liers, and therefore privately removed "it to the Place of common Execution. In the Choir are several Stalls, on

which the Arms and Title of every Knight of the Garter are engraven on Copper Plates, from which they are never removed, though the Banners hanging over are taken down on the Death of each Knight, to give Place to his Successor.

Adjoyning to the East End of this Chapel is a fair Edifice of Free-stone, raised by the most munificent Cardinal Wolsey, called the Tomb-House, from a stately Tomb which the Cardinal designed, some say for himself, others with more Truth, for his Master, King Heary VIII. this he had near finished before his

unhappy Fall, and more miserable Death. This Place King Charles I. designed to enlarge, and make it a proper  $\mathcal{D}$ ormitory for . himself and all succeeding Royal Families; but the worst of Times hasting on him, his Thoughts were diverted another Way. and the Place and imperfect Tomb were demolished and defaced, by the Command of the Rebel Parliament, on April 6. 1646. and all the Statues, and Figures of gilt Copper, of an exquisite Workman-Thip, made for its Ornament, taken from thence, and clandestinely made away Some Years after, upon some other Thoughts, the famous Verrio was employed in the painting of the Roof, and is faid to have in this Place exceeded all his other Labours, and out-done himfelf: Pity it is that this beautiful Roof is not more exposed to the publick View, and the Place it self kept in better Order. The Delign and Scheme of this Piece of Painting is in it felf very proper, and deserves the ablest Pen to give an equal Description; but since none have yet gratified the World, take the following, as communicated to me by a worthy Gentleman, who, though altogether unskilled in these Affairs, was unwilling this should be entirely omitted, viz.

Ist. King James the Second in his Royal Garter Robes, holding a Scepter in his Hand, is seated on a triumphal Arch; over him, Westward, are the Representations of several Poetical Deities; a Crown is held over his sacred Head by Two Figures of Time and Peace (as I conceive) over these an Angel holds a Scrowl with this Inscription.

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Adjoyning to this is another House, built by Charles Somerset, Lord Herbert, and Earl of Worcester, for his Chantry Priest; and over the Door, as a Distincti-

on, are his Arms in a Garter.

Against the North Door of the Body of this Church, is a House called the New Commons, erected by James Denton, Dean of Lichfield, and formerly one of the Canons of this Church, Anno 1519. for the Lodging and Dieting of such of the Chantry Priests, Choristers, and Stipendiaries, who had no certain Place within the College where to hold Commons in, but were constrained daily to eat their Meals in several Houses of the Town: This House he furnished with proper Utensils for such an Use, the whole Charge amounting to 489 l. 7 s. 1 d. and for all which the Choristers were desired by him (in the Statutes ordained for their Rule and Government) to fay certain Prayers, when they entred into the Chapel, and after his Death, to pray for his, and the Souls of all the faithful departed.

On the North Side are Houses for the Dean and Canons, and at the West End others for the Petty Canons, built in the shape of a Fet-Lock (one of the Royal Badges belonging to King Edward IV.) in the Reign of King Henry VIII.

This Square (in which is the Library) is furrounded by a high Wall with several Towers on it.

On the South Side of the lower Ward of this Castle is a Pile of Building for Thirteen of the poor Knights, which contains 13 Rooms, besides a Hall, a Kitchen, and a Pastry. The Stone for Building was brought from Reading, in this County, the Timber from several Places in the Forest, and the Lead and Chimney Ornaments from Suffolk Place in Southwark. This Work was begun on the last Day of February, 1556. and compleated 25 September, 1558. and cost 2747 l. 75. 6 d. and is allotted for the poor Knights, who were coæval with the first Foundation, and were then in Number 24, and afterwards encreased to 26, and so continued to 1481. when upon Account of many tedious Quarrels and Brawls between them and the Dean and Canons, they were entirely dropt in the Act of Parliament for the new Incorporation of this Church. and divided from its Constitution. appears by the last Will of King Henry VIII. that he designed a Re-establishment of this Order, and a Reduction to Thir-

Thirteen, and ordered a Settlement of 600 Pounds per Annum to be made on the Dean and Canons for that end: This King Edw. VI. confirmed Octob. 7. 1549. and immediately after put the Chapter into Possession, who for a short space received the Rents, but were constrained to return the whole Settlement back, to be employed in building a proper Receptacle for these poor Knights. But Queen Elizabeth fettled the Foundation, Number, Statutes, and Endowment, as they now fland, which last was doubled by King James I. and made payable out of the Exchequer. To these Thirteen Sir Peter le Maire, Kt. by his last Will, dated 8 January, 1621. added by a Legacy of 1500 Pounds for charitable Uses, at the disposal of his Executor, Sir Francis Crane, Kt. sometime Chancellor of the most noble Order of the Garter, who himself designing an additional Number of Alms Knights, determine to spend the 1500 Pounds he was entrusted with, on a Pile of Building for the Reception of Five he intended; to this end he charged his Executor, Sir Richard Crant, Bar. in his last Will, dated 27 August, 1635, to see the Buildings, himfelf had begun, finished; he also bequeathi ed for ever 200 Pounds per Annum to be fettled in Land by his Executor, according

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to the Advice and Direction of Thomas, then Earl of Arundel and Surrey, and Henry Lord Matrevers, his eldest Son, for the perpetual Maintenance of five Alms Knights. viz. 40 Pounds per Annum to each. But Charity, as usual, being carried on very slowly, and meeting with many Interruptions, it was at last determined in the Court of Chancery, 19 July, 1655. that the 200 Pounds per Annum should be regularly paid out of the whole Estate of Sir Richard Crane aforementioned, and that the Expences of the Building should. be discharged out of his personal Estate; upon this Decree the Building against the West Wall, in the lower Ward, between the Chancellor's and Garter's Towers, was again undertaken, and foon finished, at the Expence of 1700 Pounds. At last, at the end of this Suit, on Jan. 27. 1659. it was decreed that the Manor of Carbrooko, in Norfolk, should for ever stand charged with 200 Pounds per Annum, and 20 Pounds more annually for all future accidental Repairs to this Building, and the whole to be pay'd quarterly in four equal Portions. But enough of this, which is fo amply accounted for by our Author, Mr. Ashmole, elsewhere. I shall here omit any mention of the Knights of the. Garter, the Officers of that Order, Members, or Servants of the Church, their Statutes, Endowments, Privileges, &c. which are all so much enlarged on in the Excellent History of the Garter, to which I refer my Reader for farther Satisfaction; and as to the Succession of the Dean and Canons, and their History, Mr. Frith's Catalogue in its original Language is hereunto annexed, and the proper Additions made to it.

Over against the Stone Bridge which leads into the upper Court, is a neat little Seat, purchased by the late Queen before her Accession to the Throne, and during her being in Disgrace with her Brother, K. William III. The fine Green House, and Gardens adjoyning to the Park, are worthy the Notice of all.

Between the Castle and the little House is a Passage into the Little Park, (so called to distinguish it from the larger) which is about Three Miles in compass, the Walks are finely shaded, and is well stock'd with Deer. In this Park, near the Road side, from Old Windsor, is the Keeper's Lodge, a very beautiful Retirement, which received great Improvements from the late Admiral Churchill, who made a fine Aviary and Gardens. The House of Office must not be passed over, adorned with the History of Cortez, the famous

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Amous Spains General, his Expedition to Mexico in America, &c. all painted on Mother of Pearl, being part of that infimous Plunder committed at Port St. Mary's and Vigo; and by force of the Actors in it presented to the Admiral.

Facing this Park, and near the Castle, is a handsom Seat belonging to Charles Beautisir, Duke of St. Albans, one of the Knights of the Garter, which was built by his Mother, in the Reign of K.


Charles II.

Adjoyning to this Little Park is another larger, containing Fourteen Miles in its Circumference. It is stocked with all Sorts of Game for the Royal Diversion. In it King Charles II. built a Lodge for the Use of the Keeper, and for his own Diversion. It received many Additions and Advantages from the late Earl of Portland; and since from the present Ranger, the Dutchess of Marlborough:

About a Mile from hence, in the Forest, on the top of a Hill, is CRANBURN Lodge, built by Richard Jones, late Earl of Ranelaugh, Pay-Matter to the Army during the Time of K. William III. Here is visible an elegant Taste of Architecture, Painting, and Gardening, but more remarkable for the spaciousness of its Prospect. In one of the Closes, Vol. III. E e which

which has Windows on every Side, is a View over Windfor, and both the Parks, Eastward to London, and the Country round, at above Twenty Miles distance, and Westward a fine View of easy rising Grounds covered with Trees; in short, every Way the Prospect is delightful: Nor has Art been less profuse than Nature, if we consider the large and fine Gardens, the Fish-Ponds, and curious Greenswerd Descent to them, which, with the other Improvement, must have cost much Time, and have been very expen-Not long fince a Bill was brought into Parliament for a Sale of this Estate, but on February 24. 1713. it was rejected.

About the Year 1705. at St. Leonard's Hill, about a Mile and half from Windfor Castle were found the Roman Antiquities (of which you have the Draughts in the Page) under a large Stone by Mr. Robert Butler, a Gardiner: In digging he observed a considerable Quantity of Ashes, Cinders, &c. upon the Brow of the Hill, and found also several Earthen Veffels, entire as well as broke, some of larger, and others of smaller Dimensions. fome of which the Gardiner conceived to be Molds: At the same Place were found many fair, intelligible Silver and Brass Roman Coins. This Place was, I doubt not



not, part of the antient Bibnock, who submitted to Cafer, and a Reman Camp at no great distance, seems to savour the Notion of this having been a Fabrica, or Enge for the making of their Warlike Instruments.

To what Uses the Infirmments (here delineated) have been put, is a Question among the Learned; as to (Numb. I. and III.) some have conjectured them British. and to have been Axes, others Heads of Spears, or walking Staves infed by the Britons, others Roman Catapulta; some have thought them to be facrificing In-Aruments; but these Notions, and seweral others, having been refuted by Mr. Hearne, and the Matter it felf clearly stated concerning these two Instruments, I shall refer you to his Discourse concerning some Antiquities lately found in Yorkshire, in a Letter to Mr. Thoresby, of Leeds, with an Extract out of Mr. Thoresby's Letter (dated Nov. 19. 1709.) that occasioned this Discourse, printed at the End of the first Vol. of John Leland's Itiverary, Oxford, 1710. 800. pag. 97. In this excellent Piece, the Matter seems to be accurately examined, and the Opinions of Antients and Moderns weigh'd, and the Affair it self exhausted. (Numb. IL) I take to be the Head of an Arrow, Dart, or Ta-

Tavelin. (Numb. IV.) gave me some trouble to find out a Lamp (for fuch I take it to be) like it, already described: In particular, I carefully confulted a Piece wrote ex prefesso on the Subject of the antient Sepulchral Lamps, entitled, Le Antiche Lucerne Sepolcrali figurate raccolte dalle Cave sotterannee, è Grottee di Roma nelle quali si contengono molte erudite Memorie disegnate, ed intagliate nelle loroforme da Pietro Sancti Bartoli divisee in tre parti con l'Osservationi di Gio. Pietro Bellori. Rom. 1691. Fol. but among that great Variety in this excellent and useful Piece. I could find no Resemblance, or gather any Light. I cannot fay that in some others on this Subject I do remember any Thing of this Figure, though I have not been so happy as to see Licetus on this Subject; but amidst these my Searches and Enquiries, a worthy Gentleman was pleased to communicate to me a Book entitled, Batavia Illustrata, seu de Batavorum Insula, Hollandia, Zelandia, Frisia, Territorio Trajectensi, et Gelria, Scriptores varii nota melioris nunc primum Collecti simulque Editi. Ex Mulco Petri Scriverii, Lugd. Batav. 1609. 4to. herein, pag. 217. I found a Lamp very much, though not altogether, like this, which our Author calls Lucerna Polymyxos,

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myxos, which was found at Romaoburgi, i.e. Roomburgh, near Leyden; he describes it in the same Page in this manner, Lampadem aneam, quadrisidam (qua in quatuor veluti guttos exit unde Ellychnia flammam vomebant, et in quaternas, columnas circinarum calum excipientes assurgit) istic repertam asservat, et expressam opera Pictoris communicavit, ut bic apponetur, Cornelius Nicolaus Aquanus, bomo Antiquitatis studiosissimus. Of this Sort of Lamp, Martial speaks in his Epigram on LUCERNA POLYMIXOS, Lib. 14.

Illustrem quum tota meis convivia stammis, Totque geram Myxas, una Lucerna vocor.

In consulting several Authors to discover the Uses Numb. V. and VI. were put to, I have been no ways negligent, but cannot be so happy as to make any Discovery, or a meer probable Conjecture. I must question whether they are Roman or Danish; the several Sorts of Things discovered here do but perplex us; in particular, a very large, long Spur, which undoubtedly belonged to the Danes, and of which there is one now preserved in the Physick School near the Bodleian Library in Oxford. Waving

# UPTON, in Morton Hundred, Berksbire.

Inheritance of a Branch of the Family of Latton, of Latton, in North Wileshire, who derive themselve of Stutville, a noble Race, so call'd, from a Borough of that Denomination in Upper Normandy, and they were formerly under that Name.

Of this House was William de Smeville, made Cardinal by Eugenius the 4th, in the Year of our Lord God 1439. He dy'd in the Year

1482.

These Simpilles, after the Conquest, were Barons of Lydisdale Castle in Cumberland, created Earls of Yorkshire, (says Mr. Cambden) and much sam'd in the Barons Wars for their Prowess, and large Possessions in the Counties also of Rutland, Lincoln, and Warwick, where they were planted at Monks-Kirby, afterwards given by John de Stutville to the Monks of Pipwell in Northamptonshire, for the Health of the Souls of his Father, Mother, Brothers and Sisters, his own, and those of Hin. the 2d. and his Queen.

The same Author, in his Remains, sufficiently shews, That Sirnames were first given for

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for Distinction of Families, which afterwards descended to the eldest Son only, the rest caking their Names from the Lands or Poss sisons allotted for their Portions; and 'tis, at least, probable, that Walter de Latton (who appears, from unquestionable Records, to have been many Ages fince planted in that Place with a plentiful Fortune) tho' he changed his Name on his removal, yet forgot not to take the Paternal Coat along with him, which has fince continu'd in the Family thro' many Generations, and is still the Bearing of John Latton, Elq; of Eshur-Place in the County of Surrey; as it also is of the Stutvilles of Brinkley in Cambridgeshire, viz. Party per Pale, A and S. a Saltier ingrailed Ermins, and Ermin counterchanged.

Of these 20 Generations 14 owe their Birth to this County, thro' a Tract of above 250 Years continuance therein; but how far upward the Wilishire Line, with all the Matches and Alliances of the Family fince, may be trac'd, is left to any future Historian of that County. I shall but hint for this Place; that from thence are descended not only the English Race, but also chose of the Nac's, a Town, and antient Barony in the County of Kildere, and Province of Lempster in Ireland, who affert themselves to have been settled there from the Reign of King John, with which this of the English Descent seems to be concurrent, tho' through Distance, Time, and Usage, they now write their Name different.

Also the Figure of a Man in Armor between his two Wives, under each of which are the Figures of two Sons and three Daughters, with the Coats of Latton, Percy, Estbury, Sycheville, quarterly.

Sir David Williams, Judge of the Common Pleas, T. Eliz. mention'd by Mr. Ashmole, was second Husband to this Co-Heires, Dorothy Wellsborn, Relict of John Latton, Esq; of this Place, who both lie bury'd in the Vault specify'd.

Martha, the other Co-Heires, was Wife of William Blomer, Esq; of Hatharp in Gloucester-shire, as particularly mention'd in that Visitation, and these two Sisters went away with the Inheritance of Margery, Daughter and Heir of Tho. Poure, Esq; of Blechington in Oxfordshire.

This Family of Wellsborn, now quite extinct, deriv'd themselves from the Plantageness, by Sym. Montfort, Earl of Leicester, who marry'd Eleanor, second Daughter of King John. He was stain, with his eldest Son Henry, at the Battle of Evisbam, in the Reign of Hen. 3. 1265. Almaric the second Son, was a Monk, and afterwards fell valiantly in the Holy Wars. Symon and Guy'two more of his Sons, fled with their Mothes into France, and Richard the 5th Son, remain'd in England conceal'd under the Name of Wellsborn, and gave rise to this Family here mention'd, of which speaks Cambden.

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In Pages 207, 208, 209, 210, 211, &c. of the Second Volume of this Work, is a large Account of the Manors in the Parish of EAST HENDRED, to which may be added the following Remarks made by a Gentleman of Worth and Honour, whose Modesty has forbid the mention of his Name, viz. one of the Hendreds gave to the Abbey of Abington two Abbots, viz. Robert de Henreth, who became Abbot in, or soon after, 1221, and died in 1234. and Richard de Hendred, who became Abbot of that House in 1262, and died 1289.

The Manor of Becker, likewise in the Parish of Shrivenham, near Farington, in this County, lately Part of the Possessions of Major Wildman, and at present belonging to Barington Shute, Esq.; is also held of this Manor by the yearly

Rent of Four Pounds.

To what is said of the second Manor, called the Abby Manor, may be added, "King "Henry the 8th, by his Letters Patents bearing Date August the 26th, A. Regni 36. Christing 1544. bestowed this Manor npon Henry Norris, Esq; afterwards Lord Norris, from which Family it was alienated 12 Jac. A. D. 1617. March the 20th, and Sold to one Finton, who transferr'd it to the then Earl of Kelly, who Sold it to Sir Peter Van Lore, Baronet, of whom William Exston, Esq; Bought it Feb. 10th, 20° Jacobi, i.e. A. D. 1617.

It appears by King Henry the First's Charter (without any Date) in the 2d Volume of the Monasticon, page 957, that the Alien Priory of Frampton in Dorsetshire, had 7 Hides of Land in Hein-

Heinreth, which I take to be the whole, or part of the Manor, belonging to Edward Sherwood, Esq; called the Manor of Frampton; afterwards it became part of the Possessions of the Abby of Abington, but whether it came to the said Abby by Exchange, Sale, or Gift, I cannot tell. But I find in some Writings, that it was in the Possession of the Crown, Anno Hen. 8. 21 Christi, 1529. and that it was granted by the said King Henry the 8th to John Winchcombe, of Noke, in Com. Oxon. Esq; whose Grandson, Benedict Winchcombe, sold it, 44 Eliz. 1602. to John Sherwood, Esq; Great Grand Father to Edward Sherwood, Esq; the present Possession of this Manor.

I find the Knights of St. John of Hiernfalem had formerly some Possessions in East Hendred, which I almost fancy, is the Manor that now belongs to New College in Oxford, but of this I

have no certainty.

To the 5th Manor, called the Manor of ARCHES, may be added to what is faid page 310. of the 2d Volume, "That this Manor belong-" ed in the Year 1171. to one William de Crosbeer, and from that Family it came to the "Turbervilles, one whereof, named Jeffery, be-" stowed some Lands in Hendred upon the Pri-" ory of the Canons Regular of Pogbale in Com. Berks, as appears by King Henry the 2d's " Charter in the 2d Volume of the Monasticon, " pag. 266, 267. From the Turberville's it descended to the Arches, by William de Arche's " marrying Amisia, the Daughter of Sir Ri-" ebard de Turberville, Knight; which Amifia, " by Deed dated the 19th of May, Anno Christi, " 1323. Edw. 2di. 16°. grants to William de "Arches,

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Arches their Son, all her Manors in the Town of East Henreith, with the Advowson of the Chapel [of St. Amand and St. John Baptiff there; to hold to the faid William, and the Heirs of his Body. And after it had continued Four Descents in the Family of the 44. Arches, it came into the Family of the Eyfton's "in or about the Year of our Lord 1381, by William Eyston, of Isleworth, in Com. Middle-" fex, marrying Isabelle, the Daughter of John Stow, by Maude his Wife, who was sole " Daughter and Heirels to William Rawlin de Arches. This Manor of Arches was former-" ly held of the Prior of Frampton, and at pre-" fent of Edward Sherwood, Efq; as Lord of the Manor of Frampton in East Hendred.

There is an old Chapel of Ease at Sparsholt Court, which is the Seat of the late William Wiseman, and lyes between the two Hindreds...

There is no Doubt to be made, but that there was at Hendred, (before it fell to decay) a Free School, fince there is one at Hanwell, which never was a Market Town, nor ever so considerable.

An ACCOUNT of Mr. JOHN
BLAGRAVE, the famous Mathematician, who lived at Reading in
Com. Berks, in the Roign of Queen
Elizabeth, and King James I.
(mentioned in page 359. of the Second Volume.)

KE was noted in his Time for an excellear Mathematician, and wrote feveral Books on that Subject; one was called his Mathematical Jenucl. and also another of Dialling. He listh buried in St. Mary Church in Reading, his Monument being by himself ordered whilst living. monest many of his Virtues, this one was obfervable, a generous Love for all his Kindred: He made also such a Will, as surprised all the Gentlemen of the Long Robe, so exact, so mathematical it was. Take a small Testimony also of his Kindness to his Relations. He had Three Beothers, Authory, Edward, and Alexander. to whose Sons, his Nephews, he gave very liberally in his Life. And now observe what Provision his Will makes for his Kindred to be begotten gotten by the said Nephews. "Item, I give unto the Children of the Sons of my Brothers, 50 Pound a piece, to be paid them at the Age of 26 Years, according to their Seniority,' which said 50 Pound a Piece has paid near 80 Persons born after his decease, of his Second Cousins.

Another Act of Bounty was to the Maids of Reading. You are to Note that there are three Parish Churches, and he doth devise that each Church Warden should send on Good Friday one virtuous Maid that has lived five Years with her All three Maids appear at the Town Hall before the Mayor and Aldermen, and cast Dice; she that throws most has Ten Pounds put in a Purse, and she is to be attended with the other two that lost the Throw. Year come again the two Maids, and one more added to them. He orders in his Will, that each Maid should have three Throws before she loseth it, and if she has no luck in the three Years, he orders that still new Faces may come and be prefented.

On the same Good Friday he gives eighty Widows Money to attend, and orders ten Shillings for a good Sermon, and so he wishest well to all his Country Women. It is lucky Money, for I never heard but the Maid that had the ten Pounds, suddenly had a good Husband.

This Account I had from Mr.... Blagrave, Bookseller, at the Bear in St. Paul's Church Yard, who is descended from him (or of that Kin) An. 1699.

Note,

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Note, That the Legacy given by Mr. John Blagrave to his Kindred, was a Lease of 99 Years; the Time expired but at Midsummer, 1690. All the Kindred was paid, and the Inheritance of the said Estate went to Mr. Daniel Blagrave, Counsellor at Law, lately deceased. The Lands were at Southest near Reading. The Money paid to the Maids, is out of Lands settled for that use at Swallowsseld in this County.

Moone being that Night at the full, and as wee geft about tow Houers, or more, high, nere eight or nine a Cloke at Night, it had a mighty Cloude round about it, as spacious as a Court; but round in Compass, and overthwit it, to the atmost Bounds of it, a Crosse in Forme, just as the Crossin Couleurs of Eengland, but so shining bright, as the Moone being in the midst, and center of it, could not possible bee diserned from it but by a round Body apearing in the comes of the Crose; and although the Moone stoode in the midst of a Cloude as blake as Darkness it

felf, yet did it shine as bright as if it bine the clearest part of Heaven, the Firmament being at that Tyme also exceeding cleare and faire. At the upper end of Crose towards Heaven came out a round Cloude so bigge as a Rainebow, of the bignes of a Hand-bow might compal like a Coronet; the which a Rainebow did the brightest and clereft of Couloure as possible could be seene. The Ends towards the North and South hade firems of Light running bake again towards the Moone, but the end towards the Earth had nothing at all; and although wee were continually coming and going, for as I think, the space of two Houers, in which it appeared, yet could none diescerne how it vanished away, so suddenly it vanish't, so suddenly was it gonne; nether was ther any Alteration in it at all, but stood still in the same Forme and Fation all that Tyme.

I have ever thought, from the first apering of this wonderful Sine, that the Full Moone in it sigured forth the Estat of the Church now ners her fulines; the round and mighty blake Cloud that enveroned it, the Assictions and universals Trobles that shall beset her on all Sids in this last Tymes, as our Lord Jesus hath forewarned

in the Holy Scripturs.

The little Cloud crouned with the Rainebow, that God will ashuredly remember his Holy Covenant and Promise to his Church, and give it a most glorious and certine Victory over all Affliction and Troble whatsoever, signify'd by that bright shining and triumphant Cross.

That the Moone and Cross making one intire Body, shew how conceparable the Cross E e e a is annexed to the Church, yet shall it at last bring fourth to it a most exilent and an eternal

waite of Glory,

That the Stremes of Light turning bake from the Ends of the Cross towards the Mone, as I think, signific from what Parts of the World God will raif som Help and Bide to his Church, until by the glorious Coming of our Lord Jesus Christ all her Calamitys shall have a blessed and most happy end.

## The Resons moveing me thus to think are thes.

Our Lord Jesus Christ giveth us most certine Warning of Signs in this very kind before his imanedent coming to Judgment. Ther shall bee, saith hee, Signes in the Sunne, and in the Moone, and in the Stars, Troble among the Notion with Preplectie -That it is ordinary among Devins to take the Monne as an Emlene of the Church, in respect of her often Changes, and for that is fayd, she receiveth all her Light and Beauty from the Sonne, as the Church from the Sonne of Rightioulness, Christ Jesus. How frequent it is in Scriptuer to take Clouds and Darknes for Trubulation. and all manner of Afflictions. I nede not write the lamentable Calamities of the Tyme, reade a large Comment upon this Part, because the Rainebow is a Sinne of God's Favour and Coyenant, and sete in the Firmament by God himself, to remember him of his Covenant; also Christ Jesus, the Angel of this, is described in the Rainebow descending doune from Heayen, clothed with a Cloud, and the Rainebow (377)

upon his Head. That the Cross is a Sine of of Victory ever, Saint Paul shewes us in the Person of Christ Jesus himself, in that haveing spoyled Principalitis and Powers, he made a thew of them openly, triumphing over them in the same Cross. And although the Cross bee often taken for Affliction, yet in this, even the blody Cross apearing so glorious bright and resplendant, dos undoudedtly betoken and fortell Light and Deliverance to the Church. as that Cross, fo famous in Ecclesiastical History, apering to the great Constantine before his notable and most triumphant Victory, wherwith hee ended the ten blody Percicutions, and the Calamityes of the Primitive Church.

If any mervile that this Sine being seene divers Yeres agoe, why now, rather then all this Tyme it comes to be taken notis of? I answer in a Word, That the lamentable Condition of the Christian World at this Tyme, 1633. is able to awaken the Memory of so strange and

nottable a Thing as this was.
